Questions for Personal and Family Devotions

1. When you confess, *"I believe in the resurrection of the body,"* what emotions or thoughts does that stir in you? Does it truly function as comfort? Why or why not?
2. What difference does it make that the same power that raised Christ will raise you? How does Christ's resurrection strengthen your assurance?
3. How does believing that your *very flesh* will be raised challenge the idea that the body is unimportant or disposable?
4. How does "the resurrection of the body" comfort you?
